## March Musicale Madness: Two Festive Evenings of Song

Looking for a break from this winter weather, but not quite ready for NCAA basketball? Come to First U for *March Musicale Madness: Two Festive Evenings of Song.* The Brooklyn Unitarian Quartet, soprano Marielle Murphy, mezzo soprano Melissa Paul, tenor K'idar Miller, and baritone Andrew Cook-Feltz will offer two delightful Friday evening programs of music ranging from the Baroque to Modern on **March 7th** and **March 28th**. The quartet will be accompanied by Music Director, William Peek, on piano, harpsichord, and organ, and Alden Gatt on piano.

The March 7th program will feature music from the Baroque through the Romantic periods. Works will include four songs by Purcell, selections from Handel's *Messiah*, Mozart's Concert Aria *No che non sei capace*, and four songs by Franz Liszt. The program will continue with the ravishing *Bell Song* and *Flower* 

Duet from Léo Delibes's opera Lakmé, and will conclude with selections from Brahms' beloved Liebeslieder Waltzes. The March 28th program will focus on music composed in the 20th and 21st centuries. Andrew Cook—Feltz will perform Ralph Vaughan Williams' haunting cycle Songs of Travel and Samuel Barber's Four Songs, Opus 13. The program will also include a selection of African American songs and vocal jazz.

A suggested donation of \$25 is requested for each concert or \$35.00 for both (\$15 / \$25 for students and seniors). Patron tickets (includes reserved seating and champagne) are available for \$75 for each concert / \$100 for both. Proceeds will benefit the First Unitarian music program.

## **Report from the Board**

To the Members and Friends of First Unitarian,

During the February 9th congregational meeting, I, representing trustees, updated the congregation on matters addressed by trustees in the past nine months.

Attendance, membership and contributions all are up appreciably and this success has been a factor in a number of trustees' decisions. Among other matters discussed with the congregation:

- Stefan Jonasson, a strategic advisor for the UUA, met with trustees for a very long evening in the fall to discuss our own position and progress and broader trends impacting UU congregations. Trustees are hopeful of meeting with Stefan in the future.
- Trustees appointed Garnett Losak as the congregation's Director of Membership and Communications. As part of her responsibilities, Garnett developed, and trustees approved, a communications policy intended to facilitate and coordinate communications within the congregation and with those outside the congregation.
- Trustees asked our senior minister to lead the effort to identify and hire a new music director. Bill Peek is leaving at the end of the program year after many years of distinguished service. Trustees authorized the Standing Committee (which includes Rachel Michael, Brian Dauth, Jeff Muller and me) to appoint an advisory board to assist Ana in this effort.
- During the current program year, trustees are working with a balanced budget the first balanced budget in

many years. Supporting the budget are higher contributions and an increase in endowment funds available resulting from the sale of the parsonage.

- The Flatbush Committee (chaired by Myra Addington) recommended to trustees a donation from the Flatbush Fund to Original Blessing, a start-up congregation in Williamsburg. The terms of the agreement establishing the Flatbush Fund require our congregation's trustees to approve any recommendation for a distribution from the Flatbush Fund. Trustees reviewed the Committee's analysis of Original Blessing's request for funding and approved the Committee's recommendation.
- David Provost, chair of the congregation's investment committee, reviewed with trustees the performance of our endowment funds and the congregation's policies for withdrawing funds from the endowment funds.
- Garnett Losak recommended, and the Board approved, the creation of a Share the Plate Committee which will solicit recommendations for Share the Plate beneficiaries from the wider congregation and make recommendations to the Board of Trustees for approval.
- Trustees approved a proposal to replace the aging pews in the chapel with more modern and comfortable chairs.

If you've been around First U for awhile you know that the period between Christmas and the spring auction is our busiest time of year. It seems like we spend the fall revving our engines and the winter and spring zooming around the track.

In February we welcomed seven new members and, as of this writing, we are expecting at least ten more in March. As the mother of two graduates of our Sunday school I am especially pleased that three of our teens have chosen to join us in membership. Ben Eisenstadt signed the book in February and Emily DePorto and Ethan Muller will join in March. Every new member is a blessing, but when it's someone I knew as a babe in arms, well, what can I say? If you are ready to become a member of our congregation, please contact me. You are welcome to join anytime, but March 16th is the latest date you may sign the membership book and be eligible to vote at our Annual Meeting on May 18th.

I was very excited to convene the first meeting of our new Share the Plate Committee. This is a wonderful group that is taking its charge very seriously. Please consider nominating a non-profit organization that works for justice and compassion in the wider community.

On March 9th, we will kick-off our annual stewardship campaign (see more elsewhere in this issue). I am working with our co-chairs, Peter Norling and David Garvoille and our wonderful canvassers to create a fun filled five weeks of stewardship parties. There is something for everyone. Parties include Chinese and Indian cuisines, brunch, lunch, cocktails and more. You will have an opportunity to join others in fellowship, share your story and finally to consider the value First U has in your life. Membership and Stewardship go hand in hand. Your financial gift to First U is a gift to your community and its mission. Very special thanks to those families who are opening their homes in support of our congregation.

Every year, the Unitarian Universalist Association asks us to certify our membership. For the first time since we changed our by-laws to require a pledge of every voting member, we certified more than 200 members – 203 to be exact. While this is great news, what's even better is the

growth we've seen in Sunday morning participation. We now regularly host over 200 adults in worship and another 50 adults and children in the Sunday school. We have nearly 50 people registered in Small Group Ministry, regularly have 20-30 people in our newcomers orientations and expect packed houses for our after worship classes. The truth is, we're bursting at the seams. As an old boss of mine used to say, "let me have more problems like this".

Each of you is a part of our success. We have developed a real ministry of hospitality here. Newcomers regularly tell me that their first impressions of us are that we are friendly and warm. Let's not let our guard down. Can you volunteer to be a greeter or usher on a Sunday morning? Can you serve soup or Sandwiches during coffee hour? Do you speak to at least one person whom you don't know every Sunday? Join me at the welcome table once or twice a month. Our newcomers are anxious to talk. Ask a first timer, "What made you decide to come to First U this morning?" They will feel immediately valued and their answer may very well enrich you as well.

## **Accessibility Campaign Update**

Last May the Congregation authorized fundraising of \$25,000 to make our historic buildings, which are so important to our worship and community life, more accessible to all. So far congregants have generously contributed over \$15,000, which funds the first two improvements:

- Last June we installed a hearing coil in the Chapel, like the one that has been so successful in the Sanctuary, to make worship services and meetings easier to hear for people using hearing aids or the Congregation's headsets.
- We are now ready to install handrails up the front steps to the Sanctuary, to make worship services more

accessible to congregants and visitors who could use a steady handhold up the steep steps.

The handrails have been designed for compatibility with the historic architecture of the church and have been approved by the Landmarks Preservation Commission and the NYC Department of Buildings. We expect to install them this spring at the same time as the cracks in the steps are repaired and resurfaced. Your contributions to further advance accessibility within the \$25,000 budget are welcome – please write "Accessibility" in the memo line of your check and deposit it in the offering on Sunday are mail it to the church office. ## From the Facilities Management Committee

The FMC has been active throughout the year. During the summer we met monthly with the Accessibility Group and with our architect. We are conducting an ongoing review of problem areas in our buildings and are identifying projects for the future while being respectful of the budget.

The repairs to the pinnacle near the 50 Monroe entrance will begin in the spring. Permits are in place and bids are being reviewed for final contracting. All we need now is temperatures continuously above 40 degrees to begin. We expect to present a final plan to the Board at the March meeting. The work will include repairs to the sanctuary steps and installation of new handrails as recommended by the Accessibility Group and approved by The Landmarks Preservation Commission.

We are surveying the Sanctuary for repairs and the maintenance and improvement of lighting. When budget and technology permits, we will be ready.

David Thebus has completed a survey of our buildings, an invaluable tool for managing our spaces. He, Nancy Wolf and Elaine Macken have identified a new electrical contractor and we plan to rewire and upgrade the lighting in the Old Furnace Room.

Eyes and ears are valuable. Please share any ideas about our plant with any member of the committee: Mark Holloway, David Thebus, Nancy Wolf, Liz Davis, Gloria Furman and Sara Faison.

## The Music Director Search Is In Full Swing

The committee searching for First U's next Music Director has been hard at work. We recently finalized and posted a job advertisement that is listed on our congregational website (under the "Music" tab) and on many other musician networks and job sites. The committee encourages congregants to share the advertisement broadly. We are beginning to review applications and we hope to complete the search process before the end of the program year in June.

The Search Committee is led by Rev. Ana and is comprised of seven members of the congregation: Julie Bero, Lee Pardee, Gregg Schaufeld, Carolyn Ellis, Sean McLaughlin, Melissa Paul, and James Goward. (Melissa and James are our newest members, replacing Jacque Schultz and Marquetta Drakes who needed to step down.)

We have been reflecting deeply about the rich tradition of our congregation and the wonderful opportunities we have to explore our musicality and our faith. It has been tremendously important to our process to meet with a broad variety of congregants to discuss what matters most to our members when creating community through worshipful music. We led a congregational conversation on February 23rd and throughout February and March we are also meeting with the choir, the Board, the RE Council, the Worship & Music Committee, Twenties and

Thirties (TNTs), the Women's Alliance, and the Deacons. As stewards of this search, we are discussing and internalizing the broad diversity of our community to find the best candidate possible.

These are some of the values and themes that have emerged in our discussions with the congregation so far:

- A music program that is joyful, inclusive, and knits the community together
- Continuing the tradition of excellence established by Bill Peek, especially in the organ and sacred music repertoires
- Congregational singing that is accessible and meaningful for children and adults
- A music director able to build rapport with a diverse community and with proficiency in several musical genres
- A multi-faceted music program that may include additional musical groups and opportunities for lay musicianship

## IFG!: Stewardship Campaign Rolls out on March 9th

In her letter in this issue of The Brooklyn Unitarian, Rev. Ana calls on us to be generous -- generous with ourselves, with each other and with the world. Generosity arises from gratitude, and the stewardship campaign is a time to assess the value our congregation has in our lives. Have you felt enriched by your relationship with our community? Built new friendships? Been supported during a difficult time in your life, or shared a joyful one? Discovered an untapped gift through committee work? Appreciated the emotions that our communal worship has brought out in you?

It is hard to quantify the gifts that we bring to each other as a congregation. Each of us will make a decision about how to give back to our faith community. One of those ways is by a financial contribution in support of our church. The stewardship team asks only that, by your financial contribution, you give yourself the gift of feeling generous. That's why the theme of this year's campaign is IFG!: I Feel Generous!

We invite all of you to join us on March 9th for the stewardship kick-off. Rev. Ana will preach an inspiring sermon and afterwards you will have an opportunity to sign up to attend one of many stewardship events. There is something for everyone, and everyone is invited. Each event will be an opportunity to meet fellow congregants, share your spiritual story and hear from a canvasser. We will ask that you declare your pledge --a promise of financial support --for the 2014-2015 fiscal year (beginning on July 1, 2014) at that time. Think of it this way: in your own life, you probably have some idea of what your income will be for the foreseeable future and you make decisions based on this knowledge. Our Board of Trustees also must have some idea of how much money we will have in the coming year in order to make decisions that affect all of us. For example: can we afford to increase funding to our religious education, worship and social justice programs, make repairs and improvements to our building, or give well-earned salary increases to our staff? Pledges -- promises, really -- from our members and friends (yes, many non-members choose to pledge to the congregation) tell us how much we can do for each other in the coming year.

Our stewardship team is here to help you make a decision about your pledge and to answer any questions you may have along the way. Instead of attending one of our events, if you would rather have a canvasser reach out to you personally, please let us know. In the end, we want you to be able to say with gusto, IFG!

\*FEDADSE (Federation of Associations for the Development of the South-East) is an umbrella organization of 8 Haitian "hometown" groups that give direct aid to South-East Haiti, many of which were hit by the January, 2010 earthquake. Projects include building and rebuilding schools, roads, clinics, libraries and bringing computers and computer skills to the community.

# Women's Alliance Film Series Continues this Spring

The Women's Alliance is proud to continue its film series this spring following a successful winter.

March 21st - Calendar Girl 2003 comedy based on a true story, staring Helen Mirren. In a small town in Yorkshire, England, Annie Clark's husband has just died of leukemia. Inspired by his speech to the local Women's Institute, in which he compared the flowers of Yorkshire to the women of Yorkshire, Ann's best friend, Chris Harper, decides to raise funds for the leukemia treatment wing of the local hospital. The Women's Institute chooses to publish a calendar with twelve of their middle-aged members posing in the nude. The calendar is a huge success, leading to an appearance on the Tonight Show.

April 21st - Wadjda: The first feature film shot entirely in Saudi Arabia and directed by a woman, Haifaa al-Mansour. Wadjda, an 11-year-old Saudi girl living in the capital, Riyadh, dreams of owning a green bicycle that she passes in a store every day on her way to school. She decides to participate in a Qur'an recital competition to try to win the money to pay for the bike. According to Rotten Tomatoes, a film critic's website, 99% of critics gave the film a positive review based on 68 reviews, with an average score of 8.2/10. The critical consensus is: "Transgressive in the best possible way, Wadjda presents a startlingly assured new voice from a corner of the globe where cinema has been all but silenced."

Both films will be screened at 7:00PM in the chapel.

## **Mother Theatre Project Plans New Program**

The Mother Theatre Project launched their spring project in February, a theatrical exploration of the Mind/Heart connection/disconnection. Through theater improvisation, movement, music and storytelling the group is co-creating a performance piece which will be presented on June 14th in the Chapel at First Unitarian. It is our hope to bring awareness to the separation of the Mind and the Heart and show how this separation permeates our culture. Using theater as the forum for expression allows for a variety of techniques

to experience this separation and also learn about modalities that are reconnecting the Mind and the Heart. A core group of members is meeting weekly to play and share their stories of disconnect or connection. We are open to other members and would welcome both men and women who have interest in this topic. ### **Share The Plate Committee Goes To Work**

For many years, First Unitarian has shared a portion of its collection with non-profit organizations that work for justice in our local community and throughout the world. Since our Share the Plate program was initiated, we have given away more than \$70,000.

In an effort to create a more inclusive process for selecting Share the Plate beneficiaries and in the spirit of our mission to fulfill our responsibility to the larger society by promoting justice and peace, the Board of Trustees formed a Share the Plate Committee (SPC) which has been charged with soliciting nominations from the congregation and selecting, from those nominations, an organization for the month.

An online and paper nomination form were created and shared with the First U community at the end of February. The SPC is excited to begin working together. Additionally, in the coming months, the SPC will be setting up service opportunities with the organizations selected, when possible. Being able to support local non-profits financially and through service will further extend the impact of the Share the Plate program and give members of First U, the opportunity to see first-hand how their contribution impacts the community.
