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If there's one thing religion is really good for it's zooming the camera of our lives way out. From this vantage point we get to see ourselves as just a spec on the earth and the earth as just a dot in our galaxy and our galaxy as just a dab of paint in the vast cosmos. We get the gift

of perspective in which all our troubles shrink, our human actions and choices fade in significance, and everything is ultimately okay. And then, if our religion is really doing its job right, it also insists that we zoom the camera way back in, back to the level of our everyday lives where the setting and the characters loom large and where what we do and say matters tremendously. From this close-up angle, many things are decidedly not okay and we each have a crucial role in healing our world. Both perspectives are true, both are essential in maintaining spiritual balance so that we fall prey neither to the inertia of nihilism nor to the paralysis of overwhelm.

Last year's "Forward" process was, in a sense, an exercise in exactly this kind of zooming the camera out and in. We looked at ourselves and our congregation in the context of the wide world. We meditated on what role this little group of people could play in the great planetary dramas of our time. And we considered what we wanted to be to and for one another here within these walls. Our sense of purpose that emerged captured both: We are a "joyful, loving, religious, community that inspires and empowers people to grow spiritually, care for one another, and work for social justice and stewardship of the earth." This year we are beginning the process of making this plan a reality, toggling between the big picture and the small.

To support us all in accessing these two ways of seeing, I am offering a sermon series this year – a Unitarian Universalist exploration of the Biblical seven days of creation. This ancient myth takes the reader on the greatest possible metaphysical journey, beginning with the inception of time and space, and zooming the camera all the way in to the level of individual humans and their actions on earth. It's a story that celebrates the extraordinary diversity of our world and illuminates the urgent role humans play in it. I invite you to engage with this story in whatever ways are meaningful to you over the course of this year. Read the text and talk about it with me and others in the congregation. Send me emails with your thoughts and feelings. Musicians, talk with Adam about how you might be able to engage musically!

We are also inviting visual artists in the congregation to consider making a series of seven pieces – one relating to each of the seven days of creation. We will display the pieces in the chapel for the month that corresponds to the sermon on that day. (So we will begin in October with the theme of the creation of light, November will be sky and ocean, etc.) This will not be a curated show – we will accept all submissions as long as they relate to the monthly theme in some way that is either obvious or explainable in an artist statement. I am excited to see our Chapel walls alive with the creative engagement of this community! For more information about this project, please reach out to Brandi Martin (brandimartin.bkny@gmail.com).

I am looking forward to a wonderful year with all of you as we continue to grow in size and in depth and work toward the wholeness of our gorgeous planet.

The High School Youth Program has been growing-this past year we led a Youth Service in the sanctuary, our members attended Metro New York sponsored youth CON (short for conference) weekends, and with significant financial support from congregants, we travelled to Boston for a spring pilgrimage. We are pleased to announce that the Women's Alliance has recognized these successes and has elected to fund a new Youth Ministries Coordinator position this year. This role will support youth, families, advisors, and allies to build a healthy, thriving youth programming.

Rebecca Chin has accepted an offer to be our first Coordinator! Brooklyn-raised, Rebecca is a long-time member of First U. She completed Our Whole Lives (OWL), our Sexuality Education program and Coming of Age, and represented First U as a youth delegate at the Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly. Rebecca also co-led her college UU student group. Last spring she served as an advisor for a CON attended by several First U youth, and she remembered being their Religious Eeducation teacher when they were very young.

In Rebecca's own words:

"My vision for the Youth Group is to empower the youth to be responsible and contributing leaders in their communities through the ongoing programming, Youth Group gatherings following Sunday service, and hands-on experiential learning such as fundraisers, service projects, and trips. I'd like to build upon the strong supportive community that First U has already established so we can all help guide the teens in their leadership development."

Small Group Ministry to Start Up This Fall

Small Group Ministry Small Group Ministry (SGM) is intentional lay-led groups of 6-10 people that deepen and expand the ministry of the congregation. By meeting in small groups, people have the opportunity to build relationships and deep-dive into spiritual discussions in a structured environment.

From our Director of Music

Forward! In Song

Hello members and friends of First Unitarian! Adam Podd here, your (now seasoned) Director of Music. I am thrilled to be starting my second year serving the First Unitarian community, with some valuable perspective gained from leading the choir and congregation through one full program year of music. I'm excited to pick up the momentum from where we left off, seek new and meaningful opportunities for music making, and sink even deeper into the rich musical traditions which already exist here at First Unitarian.

New and Returning Section Leaders

We will begin this church year with some new, but familiar singers in our regular section-leader positions. Most of you will recognize our new permanent bass, Wayne Paul, who sang with us off-and-on for most of the spring last year, as well as our new permanent alto section-leader, Liz Bachman, who has subbed in the past, filling in for Melissa Paul-Perez after she stepped down from the position and into motherhood last June. With that in mind, I've decided on a new, more tangible policy for choir singers: Three Sundays a month - simple as that! This is less of a strict attendance policy, and more of a guideline for those who've been wanting to get involved, but also want to make sure they're doing right by other choir members. Facilities Management Committee

The Facilities Management Committee (F.M.C.) has been busy over the summer. Work is well underway on three projects which began in late July to improve the Chapel, Frances White Room, and the Sanctuary's exterior entryways. The projects are intended to maintain and preserve our historic buildings and to support Congregational life and growth initiatives.

- **Chapel:** This project includes improving the security of the Chapel's exterior doors; repairing the Chapel's entryway floor; and repairing a damaged area of the Chapel floor.
- Chapel & Frances White Room: This project includes repairing the two metal sliding fire doors between the Chapel and the Frances White Room; repairing and strengthening the two sets of wooden double doors between the Chapel and the Frances White Room; and repairing a wooden door between the Chapel and the Undercroft.
- Sanctuary: This project includes repairing and repainting damaged areas of the Sanctuary's three exterior double wooden doors, and their surrounding woodwork, which is painted to look like stone, and which has deteriorated and is rotting, allowing water penetration.

Thomas Simko Design and Restoration is the contractor on the projects. F.M.C. Chair Elaine Macken is managing the projects, which were planned in consultation with architect Andrew Wright.

The Facilities Management Committee is sponsoring a volunteer Frances White Room (F.W.R.) Clean-Up Day to prepare this much-used space for fall Congregational meetings and events. The Clean-Up Day will be held on Saturday, October 3, 2015, from 10 AM to 3 PM. Please bring work gloves and extra buckets. We hope to see many congregants at the event.
