

Transforming Lives Kevin Jagoe (Ministerial Intern August 2016-June 2018)

We were staying with a friend, had no apartment, and were full of shiny enthusiasm to begin this chapter.

My final Sunday as your ministerial intern will be June 10th. Between now and then I hope we learn what it means to say a good goodbye to one another. Thank you all for all that you have shared, invited, created, and gifted to me as your minister-in-training.

All that I have experienced here is now part of the ministry I will bring to future congregations. Your openness as a teaching congregation is not only a gift to me but to all the seminarians who have been and will be part of this amazing community.
