The Social Justice Committee is still sponsoring a weekly food collection.

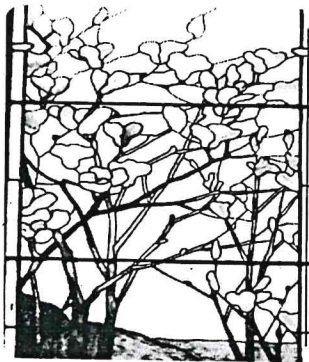

Share the Plate February: The Immigrant Law Center of Minnesota

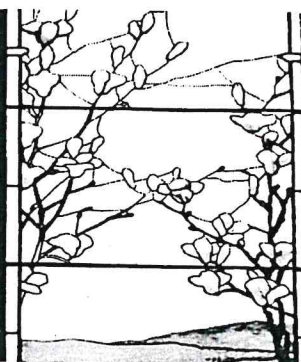
